Amanda: Once you've qualified for an IEP or 504 plan, there are a number of things that can provide for your child. It can provide accommodations and modifications.

An accommodation changes **how** your child is learning.

A modification changes **what** your child is learning.

So, for example, if you think about a child who needs eyeglasses to see. Those eyeglasses are an accommodation to help him see better.

Now, that's not an accommodation for a learning disability, but it's an example of how you can change how your child is learning versus what they're learning.

If your child needs that extra time, that's an accommodation. He's learning the same information, but he's getting a little extra time to do it.

A modification changes what your child is learning.

So, for example, if your child has trouble reading on the same grade level as his peers. He can get the same information, but in a lower reading level, and that's a modification to what he's learning.
